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

One of my favourite memories is my uncle taking me fishing in Samoa. My uncle lives behind my house. Behind my uncle's house is a stream with eels in it. One morning, my uncle came and picked me up to go fishing in the stream behind his house.

The eels were hiding because they hate people. Sometimes they jump out and bite people. We jump in the water and stamp our feet to make the eels come out. There are holes in the ground where the eels live and hide. When the eel comes out of the hole, we splash it with water and stamp on its head so it can't run away.
